Course overview

Your studies will focus on learning to support the class teacher to enhance pupil's learning in either small groups or individually, to ensure that pupils understand the work set, know their learning objectives and progress by staying on task. You will also need to be a good role model by promoting positive values and behaviours, act with honesty and integrity, take part in group activities and contribute to planning and class activities.

Career opportunities may include:

Teaching Assistant and a progression route for becoming a teacher, social worker and support worker.

Course structure

You will develop your knowledge and understanding in the following core areas:

- Wider Context of Childcare and Education
- Child Development
- Supporting Education
- Safeguarding, Health and Safety, and Wellbeing
- Behaviour
- Observation and Assessment
- Equality and Diversity
- Special Educational Needs and Disability
- Language Acquisition (including English)
- Parents, Families and Carers
- Working with Others
- Reflective Practice

Your studies will focus on:

- How to support the class teacher to enhance children's education, individually and in groups
- Planning, providing and reviewing educational opportunities in collaboration with teachers and other adults
- Safeguarding and promoting the health, safety and wellbeing of children and young people
- Recognising, adapting and responding to individual children's needs, including those with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), to support development and access to the curriculum

Work experience – Industry Placement

The T- Level qualification includes work experience; a proportion of the course will be spent working directly with children in a school setting. This will provide you with a valuable industry placement which will help you prepare for your next step going into the workplace or progressing on to Higher Education (university)

How will the T-Level course be assessed?

You will sit two externally-set exams and an 'Employer Set Project' at the end of the first academic year to test your understanding of the subject. At the end of the second academic year you will undertake synoptic assignments which will demonstrate the skills gained through your work placement. Whilst on work placement, you will be visited by your assessor or personal tutor to see how you are progressing and to assess the skills you have gained.

Case Study : Learning and development

Read the case study below and then discuss how you would respond to the situation in your role as a Teaching Assistant.

You are working in a primary school during the Autumn term within a Year 1 class.

You have been asked to support Josh on a one to one basis and have been given Josh's learner profile and practitioner observations. These were undertaken at the end of the previous term when Josh was in reception.

You have observed that Josh does not manage change well and can become easily upset if regular classroom routines are disrupted. He has difficulty separating from his Childminder in the mornings and will often go and put his coat on in the middle of the day.

The Teacher has asked you to prepare for a meeting with the SENDCo and Josh's parents. The aim of the meeting is to plan how to meet Josh's individual needs and minimise potential barriers to his learning.

Your meeting preparation should be based on the information you have available.

In your response, you should refer to all relevant aspects of the Teaching Assistant role.

In particular, you should:

• discuss and explain the possible contributing reasons for Josh's behaviour, taking into account his age and stage of development

• explain and justify approaches you might take to manage Josh's behaviour, considering inclusive practice and meeting his individual needs

• discuss how you might work with parents and other professionals and analyse the benefits of working with others.

• evaluate a range of activities and resources, including any adaptations to those activities and resources, you could use in your teaching and learning to support Josh to effectively access the curriculum.

Child Development

One of the most important things you will learn on a childcare course is how a child develops over time. Just think, how much learning and development has taken place, from when a baby is born, through the first 5 years of life?



We refer to this as *the age and stage of development* and we learn to identify what a child should be able to do at each stage as they grow and develop.

Areas of development

So that we can understand all the different ways in which a child grows and develops we look at the different areas – this is known as the areas of development, we refer to this as PILES to help you remember the different areas:

Physical Intellectual Language Emotional Social

CREATVITY

Being creative is an important skill to develop when working with children. You will need to be able to plan and prepare activities and ideas that will support the children in different settings and across the age ranges and. Creative opportunities are an important aspect of children's play and learning. They should be fun and enjoyable but also allow the children to develop new concepts. Creative activities can be provided to support children's learning of number, letters and sounds and the world around them. On your T-Level course and on your industry placement you will be engaging in creative play with the children. Have a go at filling in the chart and then completing an activity planning sheet for a creative activity – you can choose the age range your activity is suitable for between 5-11 years.

Be observant – when you are next in the company of young children observe how they interact.
