Progression Opportunities

After successful completion of your Level 2 Apprenticeship, if you already hold a Level 2 qualification in childcare you can progress onto a Level 3 Apprenticeship in Childcare.

Apprenticeship Standard Level 3 Early Years Educator

The Level 3 apprenticeship will allow you to gain the skills needed when supporting in an Early Years setting. The knowledge and skills you will gain includes how to plan, observe and assess children and vital areas of health and well-being. This qualification will prepare you to become Early Years Educators and will enable you to work with children from birth to 5 years and gain knowledge of children aged 5 to 7 years. You will learn how to deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum.

An Early Years Educator:

- •Plans and supervises child initiated and adult led activities which are based around the needs and interests of each individual child
- Supports children to develop numeracy and language skills through games and play
- · Has key person responsibility to help ensure each child feels safe and secure
- Observes each child and shapes their learning experience to reflect their observations
- •Meets the care needs of the individual child such as feeding, changing nappies and administration of medicine

Children will develop feelings and will learn how to express their feelings.



Supporting and Developing Children's Creativity



Promoting creativity with children will allow them to express themselves freely. Young children acquire skills rather than being taught them. Imaginative and creative play can develop children's social, emotional, physical, cognitive, speaking and listening skills. Allowing open ended resources such as paints, paint brushes, glue, glue spreaders and paper for children to access can engage their creativity and offer choices for children can allow children to think for themselves.



For babies under the age of 2 years like to explore uses their senses. You could offer messy play which would include resources that offer different textures colours and enhance simple language. Babies like to explore using their hands and the majority of items they pick up will go from their hands to their mouths.

Planning activities for children of all ages can be quite exciting. You can use a topic to plan

You can also use what the children are interested in, some children might like to play with cars, lorries, trains. To promote creativity, you could use cars in the paint to make tracks. Children will engage more if they are interested in what they are doing.
